## **Claire Cameron**



Claire Cameron is a writer who lives in Toronto. Her novel, The Last Neanderthal (2017) is a bestseller in Canada, was featured in The New York Times, called, "one of the most realistic novels about the twilight of the Neanderthals thus far written," by archaeologist and paleoanthropologist John Shea, a finalist for the 2017 Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize, and winner of the 2018 Evergreen Award. Her second novel, The Bear (2014) was long-listed for the Women's Prize for Fiction and is a number 1 bestseller in Canada.

She is a runner, climber, and dog-paddler who has led canoe trips in Algonquin Park and worked as an instructor for Outward Bound, teaching mountaineering, climbing, and whitewater rafting in Oregon and beyond. Her writing has appeared in The New Yorker, The New York Times, The Globe and Mail, The Guardian, and Salon.

Chris Kalman is the author of three books: As Above, So Below and The Index Town Walls: A Guide to Washington's Finest Crag (both award finalists at the 2018 Banff Film Festival), and Dammed If You Don't (winner of the 2021 Banff Mountain Fiction & Poetry Award). His writing has appeared in Alpinist, Adventure Journal, Ascent, Climbing, Mountain Life, Outside Online, Outdoor Retailer, Rock and Ice, and Sidetracked, as well as the American Alpine Journal, where Kalman is the features editor (currently on sabbatical) and one of the hosts of the Cutting Edge Podcast. His work has been translated into Korean, and a French translation of his first book is forthcoming. Outside of writing, Kalman is a dedicated climber, with numerous first ascents up to 5.12+ and 1400 meters in Chile, the United States, and Canada to his name.
