Banff Centre awards \$15,000 in Mountain Grants to support mountain stories

Mountain Culture at The Banff Centre will divide \$15,000 Cdn in grants among eight adventurers, filmmakers, writers, artists, and photographers from around the world as part of the 2006 Banff Mountain Grants Program. Awarded to projects that communicate mountain stories to wide audiences, this year the grants will support, among others, a book about challenges facing the Patagonian heartland, a photography/video presentation about an expedition into Uzbekistan, and a television documentary about the effects of climate change on aboriginal communities in both the Yukon and Bolivia.
