Charlie Wall-Andrews is a professional member of the Association of Fundraising Professionals (AFP) and Arts Consultants of Canada (ACCA). Having already completed both a Bachelor and a Master of Arts degree, she is also a graduate from the Masters of Business Administration program at the Richard Ivey Business School. She is a former fellow from the Toronto Arts Council Leaders, and in 2018, she was appointed as a Social Innovation and Cross-Cultural Fellow by the prestigious Edmond de Rothschild Foundations.

In 2017, Charlie Wall-Andrews was recognized as a "Top 30 Under 30" leader in Canada by Corporate Knights. She is currently a sessional professor at the University of Toronto and the Executive Director of SOCAN Foundation, in addition to being the founder of the TD Creative Entrepreneur Incubator.



Clare Daitch is a life-long northerner with experience interpreting, curating, and teaching northern culture and heritage in the Northwest Territories and Yukon. She has worked on community-based exhibits, outdoor installations, publications, and new media projects that highlight Indigenous and local cultural and historical perspectives.

She currently works as Historic Sites Interpretive Planner with Government of Yukon's Cultural Services Branch and teaches in the Heritage and Culture Program at Yukon College. She lives in the traditional territory of the Kwanlin Dün and Ta'an Kwäch'än First Nations in Whitehorse, Yukon with her husband and three children.



Dawn Saunders Dahl has a deep interest in place, genealogy, and reconciliation with Canada's Indigenous communities. Many years of professional arts administration have allowed her to generate unique, large-scale ideas, that explore powerful and potentially healing intersections between art, artists, and the community.

Her family origins are French, Metis-Ojibway, British, Irish, Scottish, Swedish, and Norwegian. Her paternal ancestors are French and Métis - Ojibway who settled in the Ste. Anne/Ste. Agathe, Manitoba areas. Her maternal great grandparents homesteaded in the Carnwood, Camrose, Arrowwood areas of Alberta as well as Meadow Lake, Saskatchewan.

Since 2007, she has been researching farms, taking photographs, painting portraits, collecting dirt, and compiling sound interview/video work into different exhibitions to create discussion and awareness around issues of farming, food, community, identity, and culture.



Having graduated from Université Laval's Bachelor of Arts in Theater, with a focus on stage direction, in 2015, **Emile Beauchemin** has been bringing together emerging artists through the creation and coordination of several events including Laval University Theater Festival (FTUL) as well as BAM (Bouillon d'art multi /Multi-Art Broth). He has also been involved in the organization of major cultural events such as: Les chantiers / Constructions artistique, LAB QUÉBEC, and Le Jamais Lu Québec. Most recently, he was appointed curator of shows and performances for Mois Multi.

Emile is also actively involved with Ex Machina as well as with the Théâtre du Trident. Alongside these activities, the young artistic director focuses on his two companies: Théâtre Astronaute / Astronaut Theater which creates bilingual and multidisciplinary works; as well as on JokerJoker, a nomadic and multidisciplinary site-specific production company.



Heather Lamoureux is an uninvited guest on the Coast Salish Territory of the Musqueam, Squamish and Tsliel-Waututh nations. Here she is a producer, artist, and facilitator. Heather is the Artistic Director of Vines Art Festival, Community Outreach Co-Coordinator at Raven Spirit Dance, and has worked for other performing arts organizations including the PuSh International Arts Festival and Dancing on the Edge. She is trained in Expressive Movement Therapy from the Tamalpa Institute under the instruction of Anna and Daria Halprin and uses this practice with youth in foster care as well as running various youth programs throughout the lower mainland. Currently she is being mentored by Cease Wyss at Harmony Gardens on community engagement on Skwú7mesh territories. Heather holds a BFA in Dance with a Minor in Business Administration from Simon Fraser University.





Jenna Rodgers is a mixed-race Director and Dramaturg based in Calgary, Alberta. She is the founding Artistic Director of Chromatic Theatre – a company dedicated to producing and developing work by and for artists of colour. She is the Dramaturg for the Playwrights Lab at Banff Centre. She is also an arts equity advocate; an active member of the Consent and Respect in Theatre (CART) collective; the Vice President of equity, diversity and inclusion for LMDA; and the Board Chair for Theatre Alberta. Jenna has had the pleasure of dramaturging work at the Kennedy Center, Lunchbox Theatre, Chromatic Theatre and fu-GEN Theatre. Jenna is a recipient of the 2018 Lieutenant Governor of Alberta Award for Emerging Artists.

Jessica Gutteridge is Managing Director of Carousel Theatre for Young People in Vancouver. She previously served as CTYP's Education Manager, and each year is dramaturg for CTYP's new plays for very young audiences on The BEE Stage. She is a founding board member of the Granville Island Theatre District. As a production dramaturg and director, she has worked on plays by writers such as Shakespeare, Tennessee Williams, David Mamet, Molière, Jean Genet, Athol Fugard, Peter Barnes, and Edwin Sánchez. She received her MFA in Dramaturgy and Dramatic Criticism from the Yale School of Drama and studied directing at Wesleyan University. Her nonprofit board work has included serving as Co-President of the Board of Landmark on Main Street, a community arts centre in Port Washington, NY, and the board of Bayview Treehouse Preschool in Vancouver.



Jonathan R MacArthur, tenor and opera producer (he/his) earned his Masters in Opera from the University of Toronto, studied music at the Rimsky-Korsakov Conservatory, and Russian at the Saint-Petersburg State University. Jonathan was the General Manager of FAWN Chamber Creative where he remains with the team as artist-in-residence and was an associate at Tapestry Opera. He is currently the General Manager of Toronto's acclaimed indie opera company Against the Grain Theatre (AtG). AtG is currently participating in a three-year mentorship program at the Canadian Opera Company as company-in-residence. This program was initiated to deepen administrative and artistic practices by building sustainable organizational structures for Toronto's fledgling startup company. This season, Jonathan performs in Soundstreams' Electric Messiah, sings live in Wolastogiyik Lintuwakonawa with Polaris Prize winner Jeremy Dutcher, and premieres in the opera PANDORA with FAWN Chamber Creative in Toronto.
