A warm welcome to the 2006 Opera As Theatre Program's 250th birthday celebration production of Mozart's *The Magic Flute:* the centerpiece of the 2006 Banff Summer Arts Festival.

The Opera As Theatre Program is unique in the training opportunities it provides young singers in Canada. Each year, our faculty seeks out the most gifted and promising young artists emerging in the profession, from conservatories, graduate programs in vocal studies, and in the ateliers of Canada's leading voice teachers. Now in its fifth year. the program brings together young singers from across the country with internationally recognized teachers and practitioners for an intensive and rigorous artistic process. Classes in acting, improvisation, text, scene study, period movement, dance, coupled with master classes in vocal technique and performance, are integrated into an exploration of the full range of the artist in opera, with a particular emphasis on theatrical authenticity.

The Magic Flute, Mozart's last and most successful opera, has been a wonderful vehicle for these young artists of tomorrow. It has engaged their considerable talents in a story of youthful desire and passion, of dreams and fantasy, of hopes and betrayal, and finally, triumphant achievement. The challenges of this opera mirror the challenges in the art form: spoken text, comedy, tragedy, fantasy and naturalism.

It has been a privilege for myself, Maestro Jean-Marie Zeitouni, our gifted team of teachers, coaches, repetiteurs, and assistants, to work with this wonderful group of young artists on Mozart's masterpiece. We hope you enjoy our journey into the divided kingdom of Sarastro and The Queen of Night, where dreams and dangers unfurl.

Synopsis for The Magic Flute

ACT ONE

Pursued by a monster, PRINCE TAMINO collapses, unconscious. THREE MYSTERIOUS LADIES kill the monster, then fawn over TAMINO, before rushing off to inform their sovereign, THE QUEEN OF NIGHT.

PAPAGENO, the Queen's birdcatcher, arrives and boasts to the awakened TAMINO that he killed the monster.

THE THREE LADIES overhear PAPAGENO's bragging and put a padlock on his lips, to prevent future lying. THE LADIES give TAMINO a portrait of PAMINA, daughter of THE QUEEN OF NIGHT. TAMINO instantly falls in love with her.

THE QUEEN OF NIGHT herself appears and implores TAMINO to save her daughter from the sorcerer SARASTRO.

After THE QUEEN's departure, her THREE LADIES arm TAMINO with a magic flute, and PAPAGENO with magic chimes, to protect them on their journey to SARASTRO's realm. The two young men will be led there by THREE NOBLE CHILDREN.

Meanwhile, in SARASTRO's realm, the wicked MONOSTATOS forces himself upon PAMINA. Fortunately, PAPAGENO arrives just in time and scares MONOSTATOS away. PAPAGENO tells PAMINA all about PRINCE TAMINO, who is coming to her rescue. PAMINA falls in love with TAMINO, without ever having seen him.

THE THREE NOBLE CHILDREN lead TAMINO to SARASTRO's realm, where mysterious voices repel him, but SARASTRO'S SPOKESMAN tells the PRINCE that this is a place of wisdom and goodness.

Confused and alone, TAMINO plays the magic flute and is cheered by friendly ANIMAL LIFE.

Meanwhile, PAMINA and PAPAGENO are searching for TAMINO, and have almost found him, when the wicked MONOSTATOS and his SLAVES appear and menace them. PAPAGENO sounds his magic chimes, enchanting and neutralizing MONOSTATOS and his SLAVES.

Preceded by his FOLLOWERS who sing a sunny hymn of praise, SARASTRO arrives. PAMINA admits that she was trying to escape the nasty MONOSTATOS. SARASTRO pardons her but says that she must not return to THE QUEEN, her mother, who reigns through deceit and cunning. TAMINO appears and embraces PAMINA, as she does him. SARASTRO tells them that they cannot be united, until TAMINO has passed tests of his courage and wisdom.

ACT TWO

SARASTRO summons his FOLLOWERS. They agree to admit TAMINO, and PAPAGENO too, into their realm of wisdom, if they can pass certain stringent trials. TAMINO's courage is sorely tested, when he must bid farewell to PAMINA, perhaps forever. SARASTRO encourages him to remain steadfast.

THE QUEEN'S THREE LADIES tempt TAMINO and PAPAGENO to break their vow of silence, and betray SARASTRO. TAMINO helps PAPAGENO to resist this temptation.

Meanwhile, the wicked MONOSTATOS resolves to steal a kiss - and more - from PAMINA, while she sleeps. THE QUEEN OF NIGHT's appearance prevents this, but THE QUEEN commands her daughter to murder SARASTRO or suffer her eternal displeasure.

After THE QUEEN departs, MONOSTATOS stalks PAMINA again, but this time his wickedness is foiled by SARASTRO, who offers PAMINA sage advice.

PAPAGENO breaks his vow of silence to chatter with a WEIRD OLD WOMAN, who claims to be his sweetheart. Meanwhile, TAMINO resists the urge to speak with PAMINA, and she assumes that he no longer lovers her.

THE WEIRD OLD WOMAN appears to PAPAGENO again, and is magically transformed into PAPAGENA, his perfect mate. But PAPAGENO has not yet proved his worthiness, and his PAPAGENA is taken away.

THE THREE NOBLE CHILDREN prevent PAMINA's suicide, assuring her that she is truly loved by PRINCE TAMINO. As SARASTRO'S FOLLOWERS escort TAMINO toward his final trials-fire and floodPAMINA is brought to him, and the lovers prepare to face these dangers together. TAMINO protects them with the sweet music of the magic flute, and they emerge from their trials triumphant.

Meanwhile, PAPAGENO, in despair over his loss of PAPAGENA, prepares to hang himself. THE THREE NOBLE CHILDREN stop him, and he uses his magic chimes to summon PAPAGENA. She joins him and they make plans to live happily ever after, with numerous offspring.

Led by the wicked MONOSTATOS, THE QUEEN OF NIGHT and her THREE LADIES approach the inner sanctum of SARASTRO's realm, determined to devastate and destroy all goodness.

Just in time, the sun of wisdom breaks forth - the powers of darkness are cast down - courage and compassion rule forever, through the sublime power of music.

Biographies



Tracy Dahl GUEST MASTER CLASS TEACHER

Soprano Tracy Dahl is a coloratura of international acclaim. Having performed with virtually every Canadian opera company, she has also appeared at the Metropolitan Opera, San Francisco Opera, and Los Angeles, among many others. Equally at home in concert and recital, she made her debuts this season in Luxembourg and Prague, Ms. Dahl has been a sessional teacher at the University of Manitoba for nine years and has been a Masterclass teacher at NUOVA. the University of Manitoba's Twentieth Century Opera Lab. Tracy Dahl began her career at The Banff Centre in the musical theatre program and moved on to the opera and song recital programs, under the guidance of renowned singer-pedagogue, Mary Morrison, O.C.



Laurence Ewashko CHORUS MASTER/VOCAL COACH/GUEST MASTER CLASS TEACHER

Former conductor of the Vienna Boys' Choir, Laurence Ewashko, is currently chorus master of Opera Lyra Ottawa. Mr. Ewashko is also a baritone soloist, choral clinician, vocal coach, and adjudicator. He completed six years of post-graduate studies in Vienna with the assistance of the Canada Council. Mr. Ewashko received first-class honours from the Lied and Oratorio program at the Vienna Conservatory and completed the Choral Conducting Programme at the Hochschule für Musik und darstellende Kunst. As professor of choral studies at the University of Ottawa, Mr. Ewashko conducts the University's three choirs.



Esther Gonthier MASTER CLASS TEACHER

With more than 70 operas in her repertoire, Esther Gonthier is a very well-known opera coach. She works mainly with l'Opéra de Montréal and with l'Orchestre Symphonique and les Grands Ballets Canadiens. She now teaches at McGill University, le Conservatoire de Musique and l'Université de Montréal. Esther Gonthier is a collaborative artist with many of Canada's prominent singers. She is also the official accompanist for le Concours International de Musique de Montréal.



Andrea Grant REPETITEUR/COACH

Andrea Grant received her Honours Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance at Wilfrid Laurier University, and then completed a Master of Music in Collaborative Piano from the University of Western Ontario. At the University of Toronto, Andrea then earned a Diploma in Operatic Performance, and she continues to work in the Opera Division as a member of the music staff.



Emily Hamper ASSISTANT CONDUCTOR/COACH/REPETITEUR

Emily Hamper is frequently engaged as a coach and recital accompanist by Canada's most prominent singers and is affiliated with the University of Toronto and L'Université de Montréal voice divisions. Recent performances include concerts for the Calgary Opera, San Francisco Opera, the Orford Festival, and the Queensland Music Festival. Many of Ms. Hamper's collaborations with young Canadian singers have been broadcast on CBC Radio. She recently served as music director of Wilfrid Laurier University's opera programme and as assistant conductor at the Atelier Lyrique de L'Opéra de Montréal. This summer she returns for the third year of the Canadian Vocal Arts Institute in Montréal, and is currently preparing a collaborative recital for the CBC's *Music Around Us* series in Toronto.



Selena James GUEST MASTER CLASS TEACHER/VOCAL COACH

Selena James joined the faculty of The Banff Centre in 1986. She is the artistic director of the Victoria Conservatory of Music's Opera Studio, where she also conducts the annual spring and winter performances. Ms. James' extensive performing career includes leading operatic and Broadway musical roles, oratoria, recitals on radio and television; and she also created the role of Delisle in the world premiere of *Tornak* by composer John Metcalf, at The Banff Centre. Richard Margison and Benjamin Butterfield are among the many noted singers who have studied with Ms. James.



Jean-Aimé Lalonde ASSISTANT MOVEMENT COACH

Jean-Aimé Lalonde is a York University graduate with an Honours Bachelor of Fine Arts in Dance majoring in both ballet and modern. After dancing with Desrosiers Dance Theatre for several years, M. Lalonde was appointed to assistant artistic director. Since then, he has taught at York and Ryerson Universities, the latter for which he choreographed an original work entitled, *Shades In Time*.



Yulia Levin REPETITEUR/COACH

Yulia Levin is the only pianist chosen by Placido Domingo for the 2006-2007 Domingo-Thornton Young Artist Program of the Los Angeles Opera. She has performed in the San Francisco Opera's Merola Program, at Carnegie Hall (Weill Recital Hall), in Prairie Debut Tour of Western Canada, as well as at festivals in Italy and Spain. Yulia is a grant recipient from the Canada Council for the Arts. She is a proud owner of two fat Persian cats.



Michael Meraw ASSOCIATE VOCAL TEACHER/SENIOR ARTIST

Baritone Michael Meraw is a young and exciting presence on the operatic stage as well as the concert platform. Increasingly in demand, he has been hailed by critics not only for his "rich, virile sound..." but also his abilities as an actor, "The most satisfying performer in every regard is Michael Meraw: a very beautiful voice and a true sense of the comic." Recently Mr. Meraw has sung Verdi for Opera in Concert, Estacio for Edmonton Opera, and workshopped Estacio's new Opera *Frobisher* for The Banff Centre. He has also been busy giving recitals of Strauss, Mahler, Schumann, and Debussy for various recital societies around the country.



John Murrell, O.C., A.O.E., L.L.D. (Hon.) TRANSLATOR FOR ENGLISH DIALOGUE AND SURTITLES

One of the most frequently produced of all Canadian playwrights, John Murrell's plays have been translated into 15 different languages and performed in more than 35 countries around the world. His awardwinning works include *Memoir* (produced at the Stratford Festival in 1990), *Waiting For The Parade* (in the Shaw Festival's 2004 season), *Farther West, Democracy*, and *The*

Faraway Nearby, as well as translations of Chekhov's Uncle Vanva and Sophocles' Oedipus The King (both commissioned and first produced by Stratford). Most recently. he wrote the libretto for the acclaimed new opera Filumena, composed by John Estacio. and co-produced by The Banff Centre and The Calgary Opera. John Murrell has been Artistic Director of Theatre Arts (1999-2005). Acting Vice-President, Programming (2004-2005), and from 2005. Executive Artistic Director of Performing Arts at The Banff Centre. In 2002, he received the coveted Walter Carsen Prize for Excellence in the Performing Arts and the Alberta Order of Excellence, and, in 2003, he was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada. In 2005 he received the inaugural Lieutenant Governor of Alberta Arts Award, and an honourary Doctor of Laws degree from The University of Calgary.



Kelly Robinson PROGRAM HEAD/STAGE DIRECTOR

Kelly Robinson's career spans theatre, opera, and film. His award winning work as a director and choreographer has been seen at The National Arts Centre, CanStage, the Stratford and the Shaw Festivals, The Palace Theatre in New York, The Eugene O'Neill Theatre Centre, and London's West End. His work with opera includes the companies of Vancouver, Portland, Dallas, Quebec City, Calgary, Utah, and Minnesota. Film and television credits include choreography for Columbia Pictures, CBC, NBC, and ABC Television. Recent work as a director includes the world premiere of *Filumena* for The Banff Centre and Calgary Opera, *High Society* for The Shaw Festival, *Guys and Dolls* for The Stratford Festival, and *Dead Man Walking* for Calgary Opera. Mr. Robinson is a former associate artistic director of the Banff Music Theatre Ensemble, the Edmonton Opera, and Comus Music Theatre in Toronto. He holds a law degree from York University and is the director of creative development for Toronto's Mirvish Productions.



Yves Saint-Amant DICTION COACH

A professional singer for over 30 years, Yves Saint-Amant studied music and German at the Université de Montréal, where he has been teaching German diction to singers since 2002. Active as a soloist in the 1980s, he still sings regularly with the Chapelle de Québec and the Montréal chamber choir VivaVoce, and is a longstanding member of the Studio de musique ancienne de Montréal. He has been a member of the Opéra de Montréal chorus since 1990.



Paul A. Skirzyk STAGE MANAGER

A native Winnipegger, Paul has stage managed with many opera companies across the nation, most recently with Manitoba, Calgary, Regina, Ottawa, and Edmonton. Additionally he has worked on over 30 large scale musicals, multiple cross-Canada tours, and was the stage manager for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet for over two seasons. His work has also taken him on tours throughout China, Korea, and the USA.



Gérard Théorêt ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR/CHOREOGRAPHER AND MOVEMENT COACH

Currently a full professor at Cornish College of the Arts, Gerard is a former soloist with Canada's Royal Winnipeg Ballet, and has worked with such dance and theatre luminaries as Agnes De Mille, Gillian Lynne, Hal Prince, and Brian Macdonald. Trained in Britain as an actor, he has performed roles from Shakespeare to Lloyd Webber. He works internationally as a master teacher, choreographer and director. Returning to Banff brings back wonderful memories of the days he and Kelly Robinson were students here.



Kinza Tyrrell REPETITEUR/COACH

Victoria native Kinza Tyrrell has a Doctorate in piano and vocal coaching after studying extensively at various institutions in Graz, Salzburg, and at Tanglewood, Merola, University of Toronto, and McGill. She is currently on faculty at the Canadian Opera Company where she will help launch Wagner's *Ring Cycle* this summer in the new opera house.



Michael Waller ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR/ACTING TEACHER

Michael Waller has directed, written and acted throughout North America. Directing highlights include: *Much Ado About Nothing* and *Othello* (Dora Nomination-Outstanding Direction); Eric Woolfe's *Dear Boss* (Dora Nomination-Outstanding Direction). He has assistant-directed at the Stratford Festival and was the apprentice director for the Birmingham Conservatory Training program. He has written two radio dramas for CBC, is a recipient of the Ken Macdougall Award for Most Promising Director, and is a graduate of the acting program of Carnegie Mellon University. Most importantly, Michael is husband to Louise and father to Dahlia.



Robin Wheeler REPETITEUR/COACH

Robin Wheeler is in steady demand as a coach and accompanist throughout Canada and the United States. Music director for Toronto's Opera Anonymous, conductor for Toronto Operetta Theatre and Opera McGill, are just a few of his professional credits. For more than five years Mr. Wheeler has served as head coach and assistant conductor with Opera North in New Hampshire. He has been heard on both Vermont PBS and the CBC accompanying vocal recitals. Robin Wheeler is currently music director of the University of Montréal's Opera Training Program.



Michael Whitfield LIGHTING DESIGNER

Michael Whitfield has been associated with the Canadian Opera Company for more than 20 years and has also designed for companies throughout North America, Welsh National Opera, and the Netherlands Opera.

Since 1974, Mr. Whitfield has been associated with the Stratford Festival, where for many years he has been the resident lighting designer. Michael has also designed for the Shaw Festival, as well as for many of Canada's regional theatres. Mr. Whitfield was born in Victoria, BC, and was educated at the University of Victoria, Villanova University, and the University of Illinois. He has taught at universities and theatre schools throughout Canada.



Jean-Marie Zeitouni MUSIC DIRECTOR/CONDUCTOR

Associate conductor of Les Violons du Roy. Jean-Marie Zeitouni was also associate conductor and chorus master at l'Opéra de Montréal and music director of their young artist program.
